Position: Adjunct Instructor for Crime Scene Processing course

The University of Texas at Tyler offers a B.S. in Criminal Justice, with concentrations in Forensic Science, Homeland Security, and Juvenile Justice. The Forensic Science concentration includes courses from criminal justice, chemistry, and other sciences. The instructor who normally teaches our Crime Scene Processing course (CRIJ 4344) will be going on medical leave in the Spring 2024 semester and we are looking for someone that can serve as an adjunct professor for the course. The course description is provided below. The instructor would be provided with all the course materials needed for the course, including mock scene supplies, fingerprinting equipment, DSLR cameras, and PPE for students.

CRIJ 4344: Crime Scene Processing. This course focuses on the processing of evidence at a crime scene. Topics include searching and identifying evidence at crime scenes, crime scene photography and other evidence documentation methods, evidence collection procedures, and preserving a chain of custody for crime scene evidence. Course includes mock crime scene processing. Pre-requisites: CRIJ 3301 (Survey of Forensic Science)

The Spring 2024 semester starts on Tuesday, January 16th, and runs until Saturday, May 4th. The Crime Scene Processing course must be in person on the UT Tyler campus, but we have several scheduling options based on the instructor's availability, including a once-a-week evening class. To be eligible to teach the course, the instructor must have completed a master's degree with at least 18 graduate credit hours of Criminal Justice coursework.
